(1) Describe the purpose of this DoD information system or electronic collection and briefly describe the types of personal information about individuals collected in the system.

The Radiological Assessment of Intakes and Doses (RAID) is a computer program that converts measurements taken with radiological survey meters into doses and quantities of activities taken in by casualties of a radiological dispersal device. The PII entered into this application is used to associate dose and activity estimates with individual patients, which may be Service Members, Federal employees and military dependents. The demographic data is needed to ensure that medically relevant information is recorded in the patient's medical records. This software was developed by Battelle under contract to the Army Institute of Public Health, US Army Public Health Command.

PII collected in this application includes demographic data and medical information.

(2) Briefly describe the privacy risks associated with the PII collected and how these risks are addressed to safeguard privacy.

The privacy risks associated with the PII collected are unauthorized access, incorrect data entered into the application, and unauthorized disclosure of PII. Security safeguards are in place to mitigate these risks. These security measures are addressed in Section 3d below.
